The information in this booklet is intended to demonstrate to you what we are accomplishing and who is involved in developing the 43 acre site known as the South Whidbey Community Center which is owned by the South Whidbey Parks and Recreation District.

The South Whidbey Progressive Club was formed to provide a nonprofit vehicle through which volunteer efforts are channeled in building the South Whidbey Community Center. Our members own the equipment which is doing the work. The engineers, carpenters, electricians, surveyors and attorneys who are involved are also members of the South Whidbey Progressive Club.

The South Whidbey Athletic Association is a nonprofit organization which provides basketball, soccer and baseball programs for children. Our volunteer effort to build athletic fields, playground and picnic areas is founded upon our acknowledgement of the important need for children to participate in positive activities where adults in our community demonstrate their love for them.

Local contractors have donated their heavy equipment moving 20,000 cubic yards of earth. The engineering, surveying and legal services have also been donated. Two athletic fields are built to finish grade, a well is in and a cedar log picnic shelter and Bar-B-Q are under construction.

The value of the 43 acre site is \$120,000 and the value of donated site improvements is \$115,000. Because our work is being done by volunteers, our expenses have been for hard cost items and fuel. Our expenses for \$115,000 of improvements has been just \$20,000!. The donations of equipment and professional time are amazing and we appreciate the generous contributions which have been made.

Our contractors, engineers, carpenters, electricians, surveyors, plumbers and attorneys stand ready to assist you and stretch the dollars that you invest in the athletic field which we have prepared for you. We are not applying for a handout but we welcome your helping hand.

We appreciate what the Mariners and the backing corporations are doing for communities throughout the Pacific Northwest. Thank you very much.

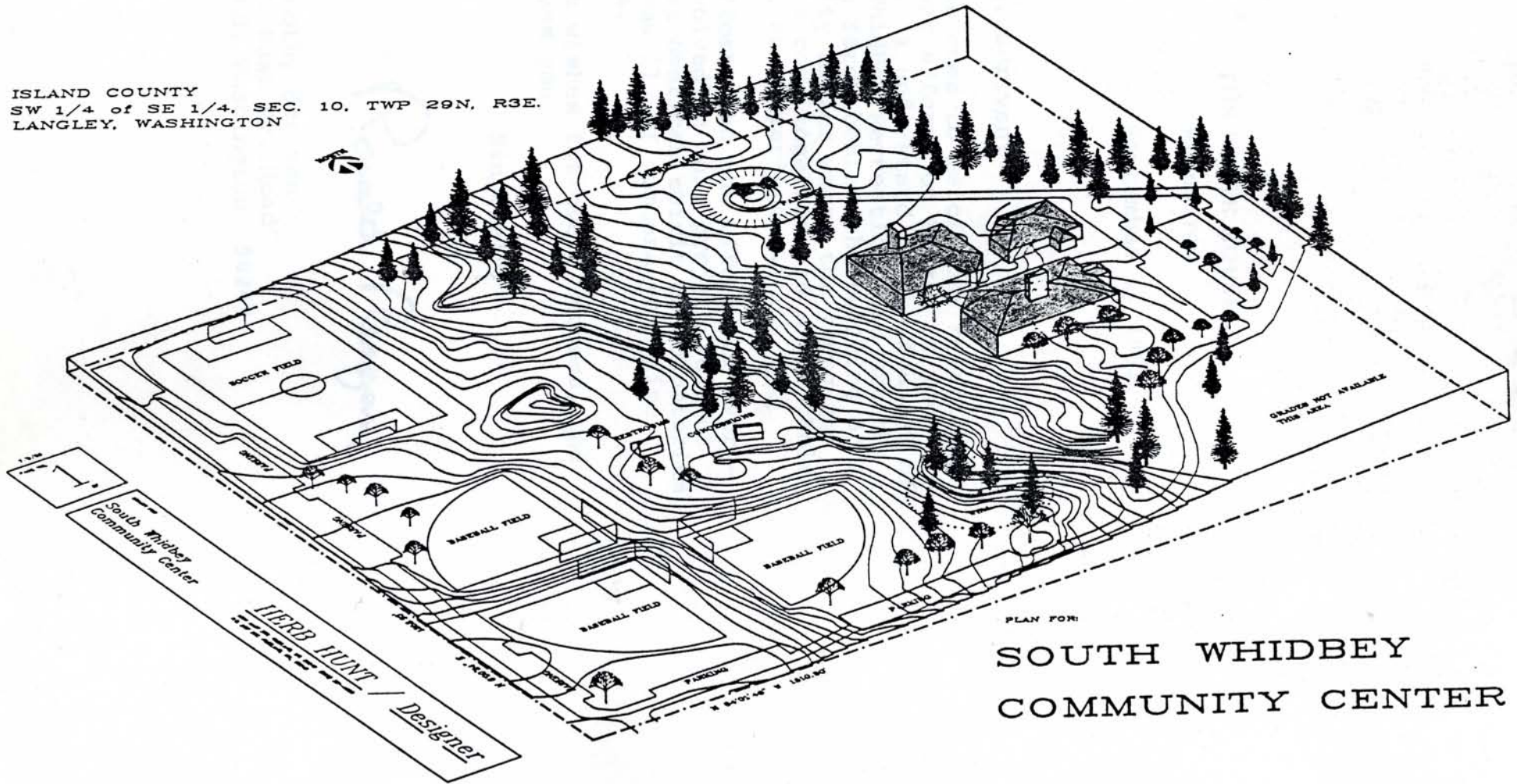



Jack Siebert will donate his time surveying the center line of the road along the west boundary, and will do additional work where necessary for the Phase I development of the South Whidbey Center. Jack is on the Advisory Board of the South Whidbey Progressive Club.

Tom Roehl is also on the Advisory Board. Tom is the owner of Project Planning Service.

Arthur Gabelein has agreed to allow the South Whidbey Parks and Recreation District to remove the soils on the 20 ft. strip of land that he owns located adjacent to the 40 ft. paved road which is presently being used for ingress and egress to the S.W. Community Center. The 20 ft. strip may be brought to the same grade as the 40 ft. road allowing for a widening of the 40 ft. road if desired and for power and telephone lines to be brought in on the 20 ft. strip. Arthur would like some of the soils to go to the 30 acre property which he owns on the south boundary of the Community Center the other soils may go onto the Community Center site. Arthur awaits a call from Hanford Thayer or Randy Bradley regarding this matter, pending approval of the South Whidbey Park & Rec. Dist. Commissioners.

Tim Lieseke is a licensed plumber and is writing a letter pledging to donate his services to do the plumbing for the concessions and restrooms building that is being discussed.

Terry Lehman and Jim Lehman will send us a contract similar to their brother Joe's contract. Terry and Jim will put the pump for the proposed well in at their cost.

Jeanne Babik, the manager of Tara Properties Bayview, was the director of a raffle drive which raised approximately \$800.00 and produced invaluable publicity and public support for the South Whidbey Community Center. The raffle project was sponsored by the South Whidbey Progressive Club of which Jeanne is on the Advisory Board. Prizes for the winners of the raffle were a logging truck of alder firewood and dinner for 2 on a Saturday night of the winners choice at Fountain Court Off Main, the finest restaurant in the Pacific Northwest.

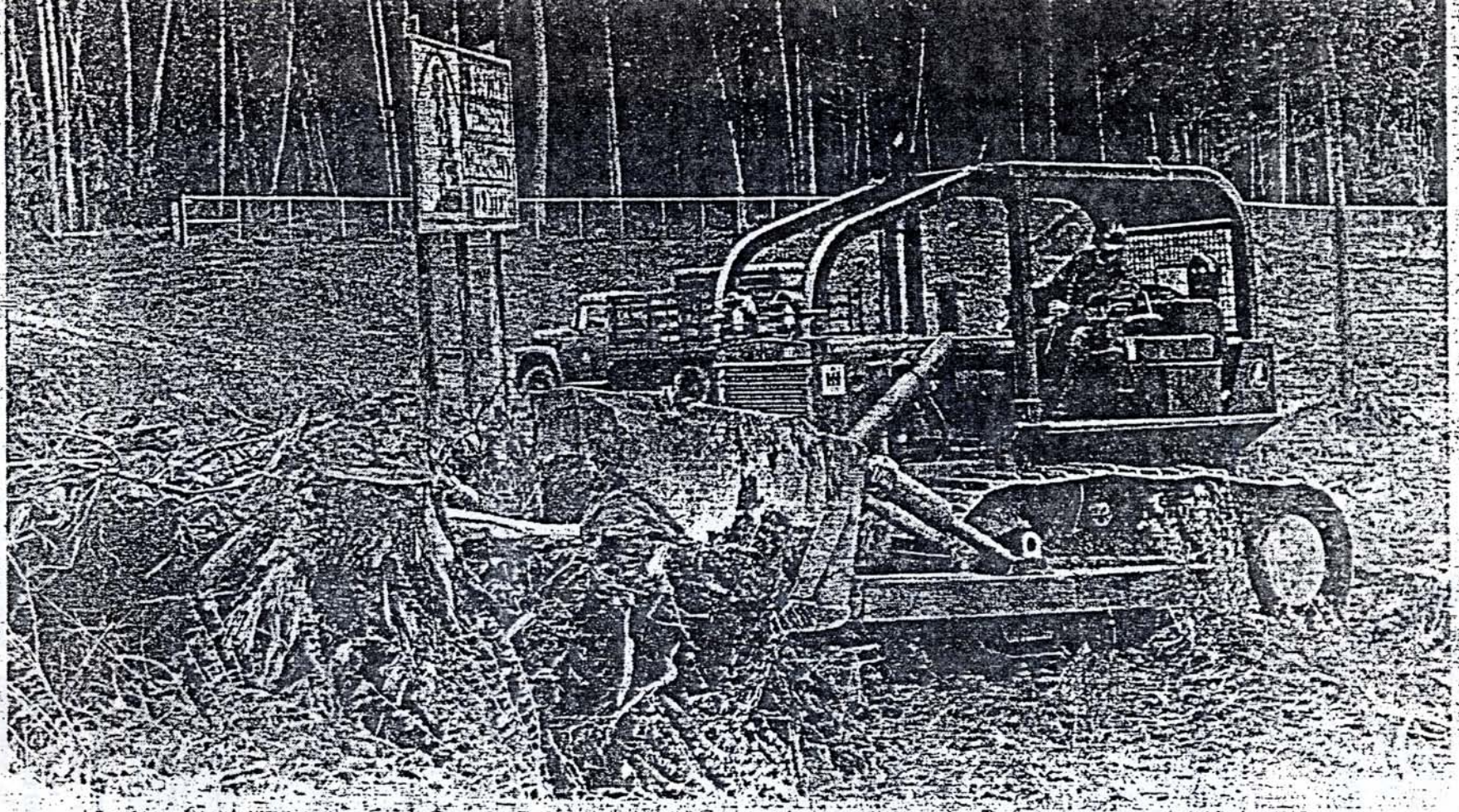
Vic Hanson, owner of Hanson's Building Supply, has written a letter offering to sell materials for Phase I of the development of the South Whidbey Community Center at his cost.

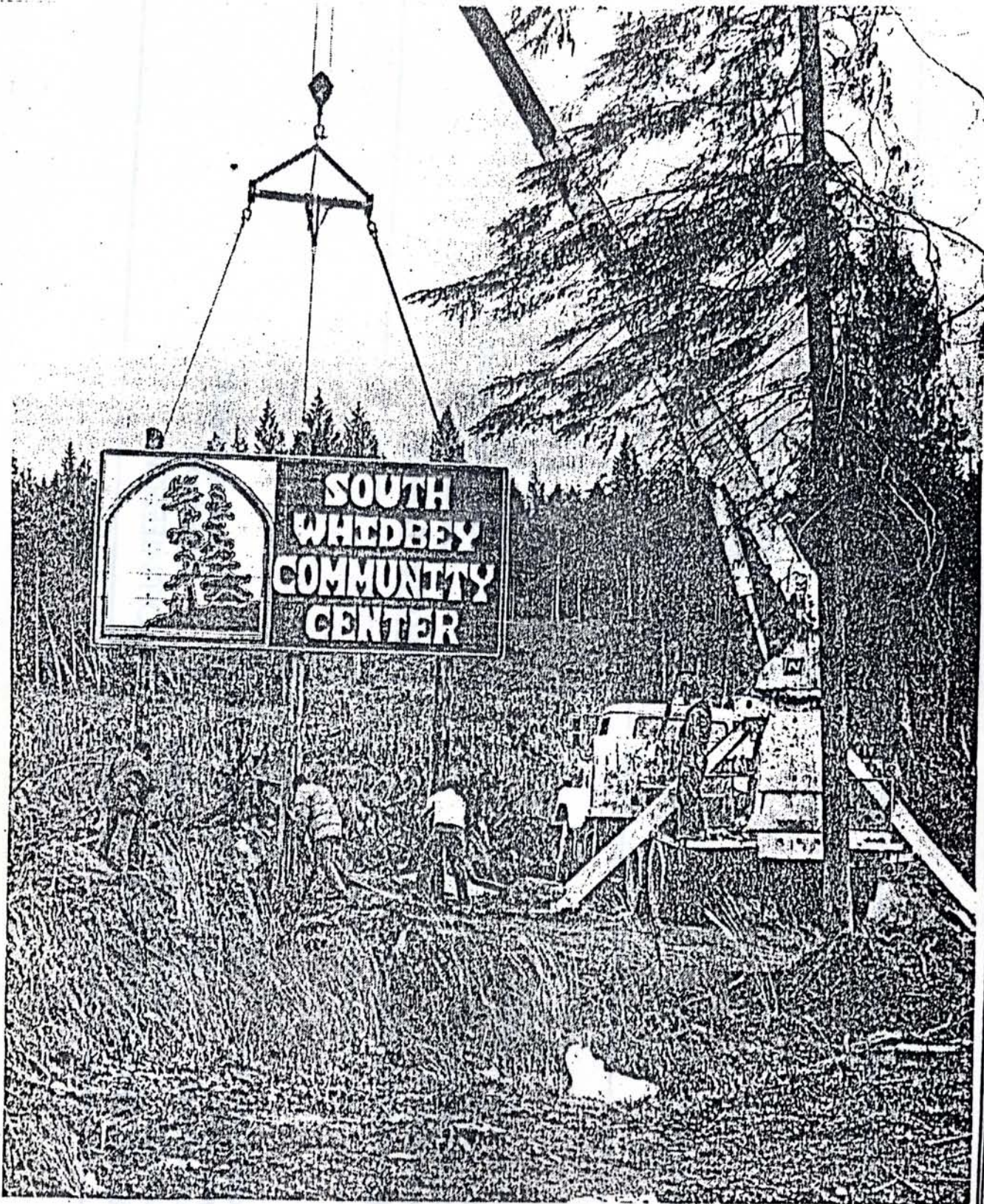


Navy CB's donate land clearing






Dear Tim:



Work days set to develop ball fields

Volunteers will be out in force the weekend of May 17 and 18 building ballfields at the South Whidbey Community Center site adjacent to the high school.

The effort has been approved by the South Whidbey Recreation District board of directors. It is being organized by Tim Scriven, a board member and the founder of the Community Center project.

Heavy equipment owners are being lined up to participate in creating the ballfields. A similar effort last fall resulted in the appearance of eight bulldozers and various other pieces of equipment which did an estimated \$15,000 worth of clearing work at the 43 acre site.

Scriven hopes that much will be accomplished this spring and summer in the area. Besides ballfields, plans are to construct and develop roads, install power, water, telephone and drainage systems, construct a concessions-restroom building and picnic and play area. Such work represents Phase I of the Community Center's construction.

Donations of money as well as time are important to the project's success. The Recreation District has twice attempted to pass tax levies to fund the project, but the first effort fell a handful of votes short of the 60 percent approval margin needed, and the second effort, though highly supportive, did not draw enough voters to validate the election.

With no public money to work with much of the responsibility of seeing the project forward has fallen on Scriven's shoulders. He ran for office saying that a tax base may be needed some day, but that volunteers could do much of the early work. Now he's rallying South Whidbey's businesses, organizations and individuals to the cause and, in a recent interview, he reported much progress has been made.

Many clubs have donated cash, and

Nichols Brothers recently set an example for businesses by donating \$1,600. Half of that amount came from employee contributions of \$800. The company matched that figure to bring the total to \$1,600.

Funds are being raised through a recently formed group called the South Whidbey Progressive Club with an executive board of Scriven, Randy Bradley, Dorothy Gray, Curt Gordon and Joe Putnam. The club's advisory board lists the names of 30 leading South Whidbey citizens.

Besides ballfield work, a well will be drilled May 17-18 by Joe Lehman of B&W Well Drilling who will do the work at his cost.

As for the ballfield work, Scriven said that's a good place to start with the Community Center because volunteers have made commitments to do the work. Over 300 children are involved with the South Whidbey Athletic Association baseball, T-ball and softball programs with spring and there is a shortage of fields.

Scriven notes that "tournament quality fields" will generate revenue through the concessions stand and tournament fees which will offset maintenance costs. The outfield grass can be used for soccer when that sport is in season.

Scriven estimates the Community Center site is now worth about \$250,000. That includes the value of the land and some \$100,000 in donated professional services (engineering, surveying, drafting, clearing, grading, etc.) that have gone into it, plus some \$30,000 in cash donations over the years.

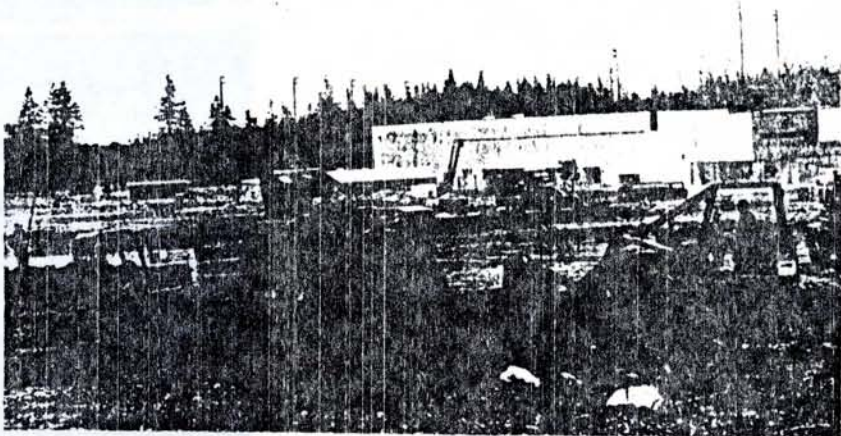

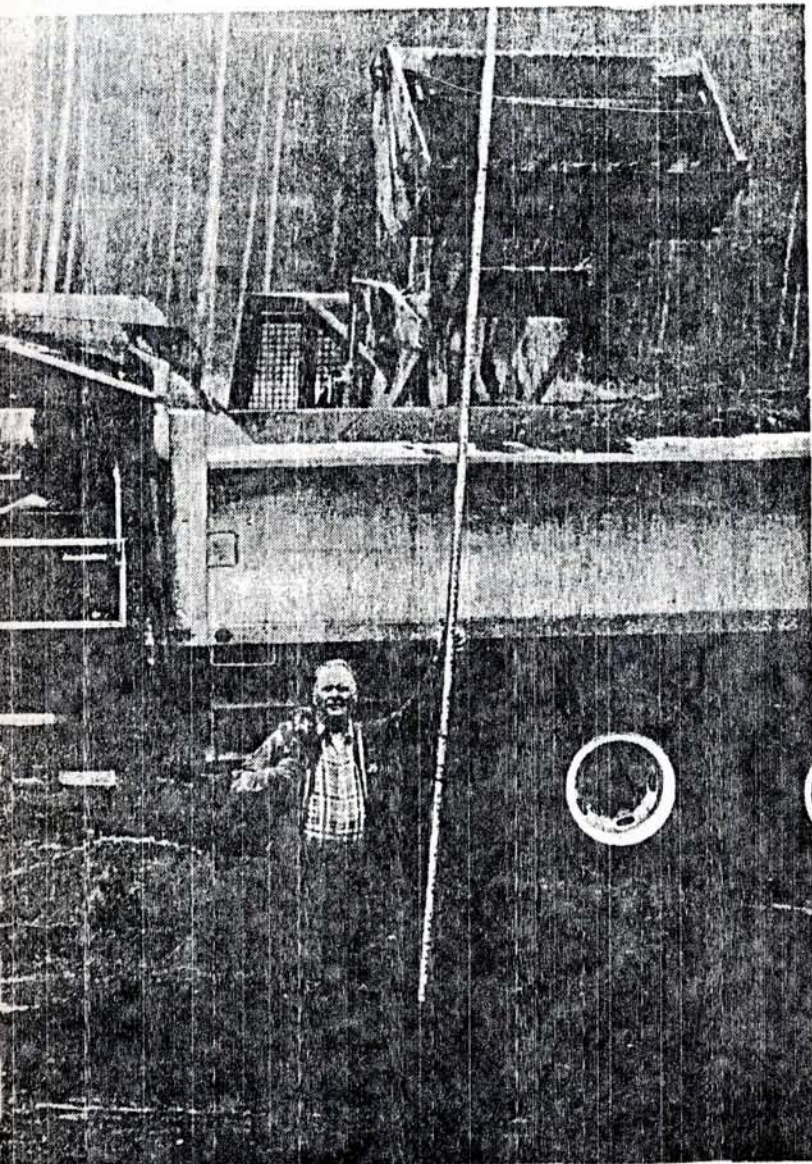

1. Children who participated in the South Whidbey Athletic Association baseball program will be invited to sell tickets for the Mariners game. Each time a child sells 4 tickets that child's name will be placed into a pool of names. On July 18th. one name will be drawn and that child will win the opportunity to throw out the baseball at the start of the Mariners game. All unsold tickets and the names of the children must be turned in on the 17th of July. Tickets will not be sold after July 17th. in order to receive a refund from the Mariners for the unsold tickets.

Special recognition will be given at the game to Wally and Betty Lehman in appreciation for their many years of support toward athletic programs and facilities in the South Whidbey community.

Former major league baseball player Wally Bunker will participate in the pregame ceremonies.

2. Heather Bradley will sing the National Anthem. Heather will send a tape to the Mariners confirming her position in the pregame program.

3. Outlets for ticket sales will be developed at businesses in Langley, Clinton, Bayview and Freeland. The money will be received by the South Whidbey Progressive Club and the South Whidbey Athletic Association in cooperation with the South Whidbey Parks and Recreation District.

4. The Lions Club, Kiwanis Club, Soroptomist Club and Rotary Club and other nonprofit organizations will be invited to participate in the sale of tickets.

5. It is important that in our correspondence with the Mariners we state the tremendous need that the South Whidbey Community has for centrally located athletic fields. Present fields are nearly leveled off areas that are spread out all over the community forcing parents to drive as far as 20 miles so their children can participate in sports programs.

6. The South Whidbey Athletic Association would utilize the athletic fields for various sports programs such as t-ball, baseball and soccer. The S.W. Athletic Association has a very successful history of providing programs for children and acknowledges the need for the facilities which are being built at the South Whidbey Community Center.

7. A quality athletic facility should be designed to accommodate Little League Tournaments which would produce revenue to offset the cost of maintenance for the field and would produce income for youth sports programs. At present the South Whidbey Little League does not have an adequate facility for its program.

8. With the South Whidbey High School adjacent to the South Whidbey

Community Center joint use of facilities is intended. It has been proposed that the softball field which is being developed will be available to the S.W. High School Girls Softball Team. The S.W. High School Cross Country Team presently uses the jogging trail on the South Whidbey Community Center site for cross country events.

9. On May 17th. and 18th. of this year volunteers produced \$17,000.00 of site improvements including engineering, surveying and the use of heavy equipment which moved 4,000 yds. of earth. As a result of their efforts a baseball/softball/soccer field was excavated to the necessary grade. Donated equipment was also used to drill a well.

The work which our volunteers accomplished was paid for by the South Whidbey Progressive Club with donated money which came from individuals, businesses and organizations. The bill for \$17,000.00 of improvements came to \$2,200.00.

We refer to the concept of producing a large amount of value with a relatively small amount of funds as "leveraging money". The weekend of May 4th. and 5th. in 1985 produced \$15,000.00 of site improvements at the cost of approximately \$2,000.00. The 1985 work party was the 1st. large display of heavy equipment being donated at our site. The 2nd work party was this year May 17th. and 18th. and a 3rd. work party is being planned for June 21st. and 22nd..

10. Picnic and playground areas are being planned and will be located in close proximity to the athletic fields which are under construction. The picnic area will offer a nice view of the activities on the athletic fields.

11. Work toward excavating a 2nd. athletic field is presently underway. To raise money for this effort the 1st. Annual South Whidbey Garage Sale will be held June 28th and 29th. at the South Whidbey Middle School. Items are being donated from individuals, businesses and organizations from throughout the South Whidbey community. Mariners tickets for South Whidbey Day July 27th. will be on sale at the South Whidbey Garage Sale.

12. South Whidbey's selection as recipient of the Jr. Mariner Athletic Field would provide an opportunity for the communitie's volunteers to leverage the money being spent with their participation in constructing the field. If this is acceptable to the Mariner Youth Foundation we will be pleased to promote this approach.

13. The land for the South Whidbey Community Center was purchased by individuals who gave \$250.00 each, with one couple donating \$2,000.00. The purchase became a donation when the value of clear cutting 70% of the timber was proven more than adequate to pay the option amount. A new agreement was reached with the land owner logging all but 10 acres of the timber and then donating the land to the community.

The value of the 43 acre parcel of land, site improvements, engineering and planning are estimated to be \$265,000.00. Everything has been accomplished through voluntarism.

Is the need for athletic fields on South Whidbey great? Certainly it is, and the entire South Whidbey Community is responding to solve the problem.

Soroptimists present awards and pledges

Carla Vendeland with the Washing Association of Churches received \$108.34 for the Heifer Project.

The Heifer project is involved in buying cattle which the government has earmarked for slaughter to deal with the dairy surplus. The group has been preparing land in Mexico and will send the cattle there to help establish dairy farms in that country.

The Soroptimist donated funds to purchase one third of a cow and

challenged the Rotary and Kiwanis to purchase the rest. Though they declined the Lions may accept the challenge.

The Friends Afar project recieved \$50 which will be distributed through the Peace Corp to where needed in a third world country.

A \$100 pledge was given to the Island Arts Council to help pay for a bronze sculpture by Georgia Gerber to be placed in the new park area on First Street.

Paul Bush with Fire District Three recieved \$100 for the Whidbey Childrens Fire Safety House being constructed in Oak Harbor. Plans are for the house to be brought to South Whidbey next school year for the kids to learn about fire safety and safe escape routes.

Susie Smith with the Island County Fair recieved \$25 toward the photo exhibit which will expand to include

children's photo work this year.

Elaine Wachowiak, chairman of the board for Good Cheer received \$100 for their food program.

Pat Goff with Save the Trees group was given \$75 to help pay the legal costs their lengthy court battle incurred.

Julie Bucher with the Widowed Information and Consultation Services received \$100.

Kristine Gaylard, who will be throwing the discus in China this summer, received \$100 to help fund her trip. She was selected by a panel of coaches to represent Washington in the world-wide competition.

The Soroptimist disburse all the funds the group raises through-out the year to organizations or individuals. The end of December will be their next major disbursement time. They will accept all suggestions or requests for funding for consideration.

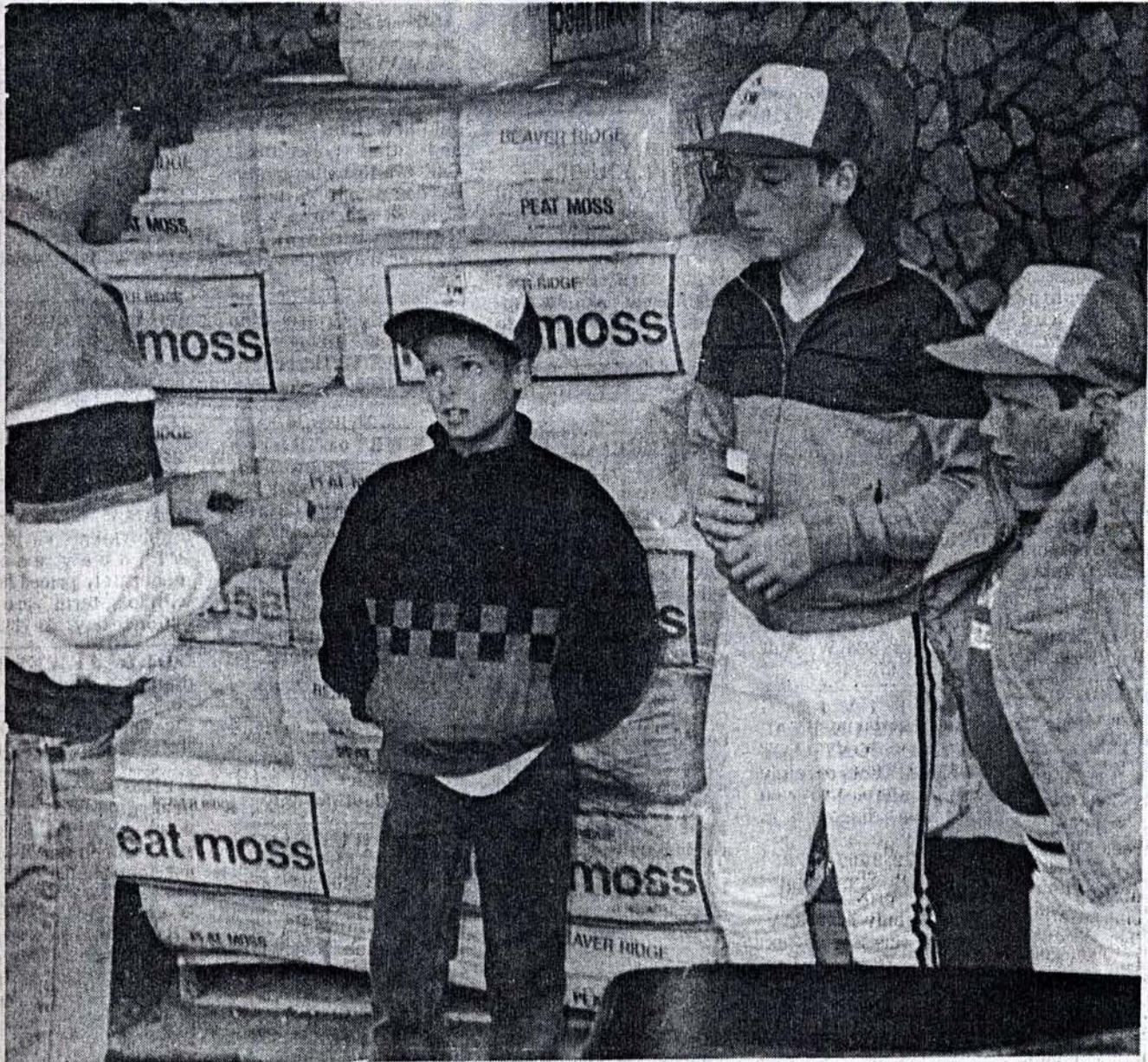


Sale, auction raise cash

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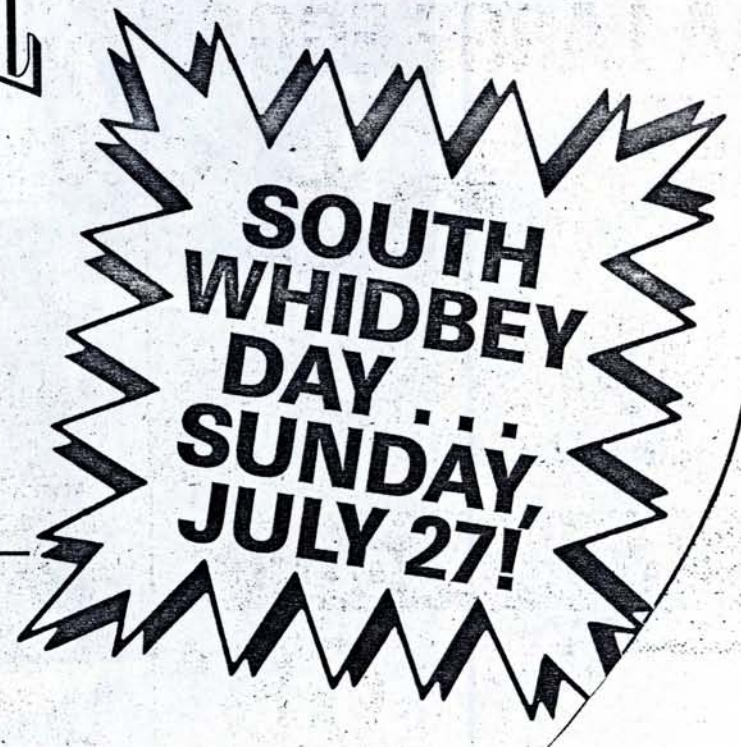

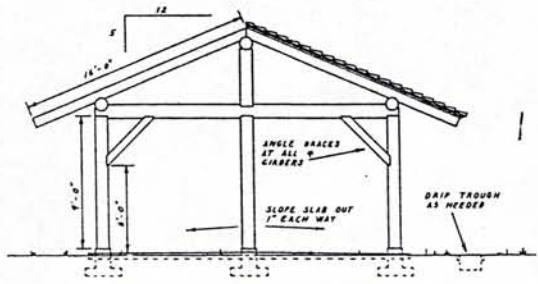
In the Kingdome

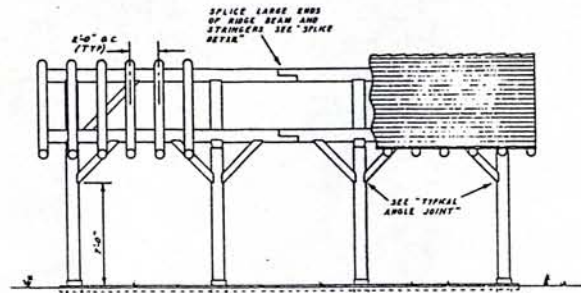
